BUCKS CRICKET FIXTURES 2024

We can now turn our attention back to playing or watching Bucks cricket in the forthcoming season and the news that we have all been eagerly waiting, and that is the publication of the 2024 fixtures. The NCCA announced their fixtures at the end of November and our indefatigable Secretary Kevin Beaumont has been kept busy

matching dates and venues for the summer. All have now been confirmed. The format for the 50 Over K.O.Trophy and the Championship will remain the same.

NCCA T20 COMPETITION (2 matches per day)

This season the NCCA have tweaked the way the T20 Cup will be played. This undoubtedly follows some grumblings about the way the four counties making it through to Finals day were determined. In previous years, there have been four groups of five, with just the winners of each section progressing to Finals day. However, this has now been altered for the 2024 campaign.

There will now be five groups of four, with the group winners, group runners-up and two best third-placed finishers advancing to a new Super 12s stage. Those 12 teams will be split into four groups of three, all playing each other on a scheduled day. (keep up at the back!) Obviously venues for these matches will not be known until all of the qualifiers have been decided. The table-toppers in those sections will then make up the four counties who will contest Finals day, which has now been moved to Chester Boughton Hall.

News from the Home Counties Premier League

AJ Woodland named as new High Wycombe captain for 2024 by Sports Shots Andy Bone

Bucks CCC opener AJ Woodland has been named as the new captain of the High Wycombe 1st XI for the 2024 season. The London Road-based outfit announced the news following the club's recent Annual General Meeting. Woodland replaces the outgoing captain, Dan Marles, who stands down after a very successful spell in charge of Wycombe, but will stay on at the club as a player.



The new skipper was named the 2017 Wisden School Cricketer of the Year when he made 1,207 runs for St Edwards during the campaign. His firstclass debut followed when he played for Cardiff MCCU against Gloucestershire at Bristol on 1st April 2018. He was then appointed as Cardiff MCCU captain for the 2019 season.

In the last five years Woodland has established himself in the Bucks side, and was of course part of the 2023 NCCA Championship title winning side.

Labour of Love

This latest blog from Yahoo Over Cow Corner arrived half way through January and will surely strike a few chords with numerous fixture secretaries around the County. I'm sure many of you will recognise one of the two individuals interviewed – Ian (Smithy) Smith, chairman of Bedfordshire CCC – and normally to be spied walking around the boundary with a pint in his hand selling scorecards and raffle tickets.

Cricket is a sport of volunteers, particularly at club level. Without the input of such individuals over many an hour the recreational game would likely collapse. Some efforts are a little more obvious and receive the deserved recognition. Others perhaps drift by unnoticed with little thought regarding the time, effort and endeavour that are required to complete what seems very much a labour of love.

Early January often witnesses the production of many a cricket league's fixtures for the forthcoming season. The end product rarely highlights or provides insight into the work and effort provided for something that can easily take for granted though. Nevertheless, in the three to four month period from the close of the season to the start of the following campaign there are a litany of fixtures secretaries up and down the country devoting their resources to producing the foundations for each season.

Two such individuals are Mark Heritage and Ian Smith who undertake the mammoth job for the Hampshire Cricket League and Bedfordshire Cricket League respectively. The former experienced the task for the first time this winter, taking over from the previous secretary who had generated the fixtures for over forty years. Post a couple of weeks to get his head round the whole task, Heritage began the process by continuing to use the same tools created by his predecessor. Nevertheless, with over 360 teams included in the league across twenty-odd divisions, there are a number of complications and factors to take into account. Including the fact that the Hampshire League is the only league in England that contains 18-team divisions.

In contrast, Ian Smith has been looking after the fixtures for the Bedfordshire League, a competition that includes seven divisions and sixty-three teams and is played on Sundays, for a quarter of a century, providing time to hone the process and become accustomed to the annual issues that are part and parcel of the process. Both provided a little bit of insight into what is required to produce the fixture lists for their respective leagues:

When do you start planning for the following season?

MH: Planning for the following season begins in August of each year, even before the current season has concluded, although nothing concrete can be confirmed until October when all teams have confirmed entry for the following season and the geographical lay out of the lower divisions has been finalised.

IS: At the league AGM in November I ask for blank dates. (dates when clubs don't play due to each division containing nine teams) I can't really start until all of these are in. Once they are, I then start and I always do the fixtures between Christmas and New Year.

Do you have a general method for plotting the fixtures?

MH: I have a divisional matrix on a spreadsheet, from the Southern Premier League on the far left to the Hampshire Women's Division 3 South on the far right, 29 divisions in total. Understandably, the Southern Premier League fixtures are given priority. First off, I need to know which two teams share a pitch before I can begin. From this, I can work out what position a particular team can go into the matrix to generate home and away fixtures, depending on any special requests. There is a special formula in the spreadsheet so that two teams from the same club will not clash, i.e. they won't both be at home at the same time. This needs to be done for all teams that share a pitch, although the two teams may not necessarily be from the same club. (*A scenario experienced by this blogger last season for a piece on New Forest cricket where teams from Cadnam and Paultons share a pitch in the village of Minstead*)

IS: Most Saturday Leagues insist you play every Saturday. For instance, the fixtures you play in week one are reversed in week ten. I do the fixtures for the Bedfordshire League, which is a Sunday League. So we have 7 Divisions and have to get the blank date requests. These are noted (I maybe speak to some clubs to move theirs as only one team per division can be blank; the other 8 have to play) and then I form the pairings. After that, I generate the fixtures with the trusted grid. I make 9 blocks of fixtures and reverse them to form the full season.

Are there special requests from clubs?

MH: This year we've had a situation involving Bournemouth Cricket Club who are unable to use their Chapel Gate home grounds on 25th May. So that's five teams across the Southern Premier League and Hampshire League that need to be away on that weekend. In these sorts of scenarios the single club teams in the league are a saving grace. There are 35 across the Hampshire League that can be moved around in their appropriate division(s) to resolve any number of issues. I managed to accommodate 4 out of the 5 Bournemouth teams by swapping fixtures but their Second XI had to find another pitch. Similarly, St

Mary Bourne have a Flower Show and Village Fete at the end of July so they have to play away on that date.

IS: Some clubs need blank dates because they will be hosting Bedfordshire National County games. These have to be taken into account early on in the process. Other clubs will host a fete at some point, or I have to make a ground available for a women's games. Also, some clubs go on tour or host a fundraiser.
On a similar vein, are there any unique or interesting scenarios?
MH: First of all, there are the five teams that share pitches with clubs from neighbouring leagues such as the Berkshire or Surrey League. This requires specific plotting and communication with the equivalent secretaries from other leagues to avoid clashes.

Another is that Portsmouth, as a city, is short of grounds with hardly any spare grounds. One club play games at the Portsmouth Rugby Camp but the local football season starts in mid-August so the Rugby Camp is out of action for last two Saturdays of the season. Thus, one team has to find alternative venues. It's also challenging for the 3 teams that have to travel across to the Isle of Wight on the Saturday of Isle of Wight festival weekend due to the high demand for ferries. Indeed, divisions with the Isle of Wight clubs present unique challenges, for logistical reasons. One division this season has two Isle of Wight teams and the original fixtures included three teams going to Isle of Wight twice in a season; two teams going twice in a month. So I had to position the two Isle of Wight teams in particular positions in the matrix to avoid multiple trips to the island for three mainland clubs.

IS: Aside from those previously mentioned, we have two clubs, Kempston Hammers and Lutonian III's, that share a ground.

Is it as simple as reversing the fixtures from last season for much of a division?

So team A plays team B at home in one season, therefore Team B will play Team A at home the following season?

MH: No, unfortunately it's not that simple. There are too many things to take into account such as teams moving divisions geographically etc.

Once the fixtures are loaded into play cricket is that the job complete? Or will there be tweaks and amendments?

MH: I published the fixtures at the end of December (it took 22 hours to load into Play Cricket!) and I am already receiving calls regarding errors / amendments that are required. I am relying on clubs contacting me for any errors that have been missed though. It's not a perfect system but it is largely accurate and it works.

IS: Once the fixtures are done I have to try & correct any runs of home & away fixtures. This can take time, as correcting one's clubs problem may mess up another club's fixtures. Once these have been amended, I put them onto an excel spreadsheet & send the fixtures out to the clubs. Hopefully the clubs are happy; if they are I then put the fixtures on play cricket. The process took about 4 days.

Club cricket and volunteerism enjoy a sinuous relationship. The former would struggle to exist without the latter. Some aspects of cricket volunteering are a little more obvious and tangible, others require effort and work that goes unseen and, at times, under appreciated. Producing a set of fixtures would seem a fairly straightforward task, particularly in the internet driven era when one could plug in particular information and have the fixtures generated within a few minutes. But the process for leagues with many a division with multiple complexities, requirements and nuances proves a much more multifaceted and intricate procedure, demanding various balancing acts, compromises and, one imagines, a more than healthy dose of patience. As is usually the case with such matters, tasks that appear simple are usually made to look so by those who complete them with great skill and deftness. Just as with umpires and scorers, so the fixtures secretaries are part of the unsung heroes of club cricket.



ROLL UP, ROLL UP, ROLL UP



ETDC Digital Media have sat down with new Henley signing Ross Richardson to discuss his recent move. Henley Cricket Club have signed the Buckinghamshire player ahead of the 2024 season.

Richardson, a key player for Durham University and Buckinghamshire, has ventured over from Blackheath Cricket Club in the Kent Cricket League to be closer to home.

"The decision to move stemmed from wanting to be closer to home and county, seeking a new challenge within the Home Counties," Richardson said.

Henley, who have won the competition eight times since 2000, invited Richardson to training late last year. With a mix of emerging players and talent, the right-handed wicketkeeper believed it was the best place for his next challenge.

"My choice was solidified after visiting Henley late last year for training. I was immediately impressed by the team's dynamic and the overall atmosphere within the club. The mix of experienced players and emerging talents stood out, and I'm eager to contribute my experience while learning from others."

Unlike Henley years prior, the club came in 6th place last year after a disappointing season. But some of their key players, like Michael Roberts retiring alongside Matt Rowe playing his last game for the club, have paved the way for Henley to make some new changes to the mix of their side.

On speaking with Richardson, he told ETDC Digital Media that "my primary goal is to secure as many victories as possible with and for Henley."

"I believe in the capabilities of our side, and now it's about translating that potential into tangible results. I aim to build upon my achievements from the previous season and continue winning games for both the club and county."

Henley will look to improve on their final placing from last year, and with the experience of Ross Richardson with the bat and gloves, will look wellplaced to compete in 2024.

WOMENS CRICKET – THE FUTURE

Women's cricket is now facing it's third major structural reorganization in 8 years. The current women's domestic set- up consists of 8 regions: South East Stars, Sunrisers, North West Thunder, Central Sparks, Western Storm, The Blaze, Northern Diamonds and Southern Vipers, all currently owned and funded by the ECB. However, in 2025, these teams will be no more, and they will be replaced by County sides.

The 18 first-class counties plus MCC have been given until March 10 to submit bids to own, govern and operate one of eight Tier One professional teams who will play in T20 and 50 over competitions. Underneath them will sit Tiers Two and Three , also connected to counties or National Counties, which will be amateur. There will be no promotion or relegation from any of the tiers until at least 2029.

THE EUROPEAN CRICKET T10 CHAMPIONSHIPS – WOMEN



NCCA Women became the first winners of the European Women's T10 Championship with a 17 runs victory over Netherlands in the final at the Cartama Oval near Malaga. The win meant that the side, playing as England XI, emulated National Counties men's team who won their own European title at the same ground in October.

Although the England side only came together just before the competition they gelled quickly as a team and were worthy winners having lost only once – in a group match against Italy – in a busy schedule of nine matches in six days. The success in the final was also England's third against Netherlands following a double in the group stage and was based around another outstanding team performance with bat, ball and in the field. England secured qualification for the final by topping the five-team group while Netherlands had to beat Italy by 26 runs in a qualifier to progress.

England XI 122-5 (Meg Austin 42, Bethan Gammon 26 not out), Netherlands 105-4 (Robine Rijke 69 not out, Daisy Gibb 2-10). England XI won by 17 runs.

Obituaries

With thanks to Trevor Taylor

It is sad to report the deaths, within a few days of each other during October, of two former Chesham and Bucks legendary opening bowlers, Fred Harris and John Mills. Both will be mourned by their club and county team mates as well as the entire cricketing community. In their contrasting styles they were feared and respected by batsmen wherever they performed. Fred, who began his career with Old Challoners, before joining Chesham in 1955, was a master of seam and swing at a lively pace, taking 323 wickets in ninety appearances for Bucks, twice achieving ten in a match and with fifteen hauls of five, plus an estimated over two thousand plus wickets for Chesham. As a hard hitting batsman he hit 1489 runs for the county and several centuries for Chesham. John, always known as Millie, who earlier played for long defunct clubs Chesham Social and Chesham Vale, was the epitome of an indefatigable fierce fast bowler, who was not averse to causing opposing batsmen a bit of pain, taking 86 wickets for Bucks in twenty three appearances, including six sets of five in a match, with a best of 8 for 22 against Herts. For Chesham he too captured around two thousand victims. However, Millie was merely a gentle giant with the bat, averaging an unimpressive 4 runs per innings. For many years he served his club well as groundsman. Both men were lively characters with whom I enjoyed the pleasure and privilege of being a team mate during the latter years of their distinguished careers. They will be sorely missed.

Sad to report the death of an old team mate at Chesham, Tony Perkins, aged 81. Tony was a fine wicket keeper and useful batsman who played for Chesham from the mid 1960s and throughout the 70s, capturing many victims for bowlers such as Fred Harris, John Mills and Brian Bilbey. He also represented Bucks on 28 occasions with 42 catches and 12 stumpings, also totalling 436 runs with one half century. He was perhaps unfortunate that his career coincided with that of Brian Poll, who too was a fine wicket keeper and also Bucks captain for most of the period.
