## You can't beat a bit of Shaky at Christmas

Yes, it is that time of year again, surely it can't be 12 months since Coloured Trousers No15 hit the bookstalls. And what a year it has turned out to be, with the severe wet weather dominating the early rounds of the T20 campaign – not just for ourselves but at times it seemed as the whole country was under water. Chapeau to all the groundsmen who worked tirelessly throughout this awful period, not only to protect their pitches but also to ensure that they were fit for the start of the K.O. Trophy competition and by the time the Championship rolled around, we were having mini heatwaves. In a way, our peformances over the season seemed to mirror the weather. In the T20 competition we shared the honours in our 4 games against Oxfordshire and Bedfordshire and lost both matches against Berkshire. The weather was victorious against Wales NC as both games were washed out , and we ended up bottom of the group. In the 50 over KO campaign, it was a similar story, as we lost to Wiltshire, Dorset and Wales NC with our sole victory coming away at Staffordshire. Unfortunately this win was not enough to save us from another bottom of the table finish.

The 3 day championship was of course another ball game altogether (well it was played with a red ball rather than a white ball! )and having gained promotion to the top flight last season, there was a degree of apprehension as to the unknown quality we would be facing. We needn't have worried as we got off to a flying start with victories over Norfolk and Staffordshire. A win our third game against Lincolnshire would have all but clinched the Division One title, but unfortunately rain washed out the third day and denied us a very likely victory. Our final game against Suffolk didn't quite go to plan, as we hit a slight bump in the road, but we did gain the required number of bowling and batting points to ensure that we ended up with the title of Division One champions and thereby clinching a place in the Final. Could we cap the achievement of reaching our first Final since 2014 - of course we could.

I'm sure by now that everyone is well aware that we became National County Champions for the first time since 2009 with a tremendous display against Devon by Captain Tom and the team over 4 days in early September, topped off with largest margin of victory (550 runs) in the history of the National (Minor) Counties championship. All of the playing squad inevitably take the accolades for this tremendous achievement but the non stop efforts of the those behind the scenes,-Jason Harrison, Simon Stanway and Jack Perham – should never be underestimated. Finally no season review can be complete without thanking those supporters and members who, no matter the weather or distance, turn up, both home and away, to show their support. It is very much appreciated.

Off the field, during the last 12 months, the behind the scenes legal process of merging the County Cricket Club with the Bucks Board continued, culminating with the Bucks CCC EGM last Saturday morning.

#### **MESSAGE FROM THE CHAIRMAN**

"I am delighted to inform you that at an Extraordinary General Meeting of members of Bucks CCC held today Saturday 16 December, members approved the integration of Bucks Cricket CIO - (Charitable Incorporated Organisation), (to which all the assets of the Bucks Cricket Board were transferred at the end of September), Bucks CCC and Buckinghamshire Youth Cricket Trust into a single organisation. This means that all cricket in Bucks will now be organised through one charitable organisation (i.e. Bucks Cricket CIO) operating under the name Bucks Cricket and under one umbrella through a board of trustees representing all three organisations with Rich Hudson as CEO. Separate committees will be established for the management of specific areas of activity including the County Cricket Club teams, Governance, HR and Finance, Marketing and Communications, Community and Equality, Diversity and Inclusion, Schools and Clubs. We believe that this integration will be of enormous long-term benefit to cricket within Bucks at all levels. *Ian Hodgson Chairman* 

## **BUCKS CRICKET FIXTURES 2024**

We can now turn our attention back to playing or watching Bucks cricket in the to the forthcoming season and the news that we have all been eagerly waiting, and that is the publication of the 2024 fixtures. The NCCA announced their fixtures at the end of November and our indefatigable Secretary Kevin Beaumont has been kept busy matching dates and venues for the summer. Most have now been confirmed but he is still awaiting venues for 3 away matches.

**T20 Cup:** The format for the 50 Over K.O. Trophy and the Championship remains the same but the NCCA have tweaked the way the T20 Cup will be played. This undoubtedly follows some grumblings about the way the four counties making it through to Finals day were determined. In previous years, there have been four groups of five, with just the winners of each section progressing to Finals day. However, this has now been altered for the 2024 campaign.

There will now be five groups of four, with the group winners, group runners-up and two best third-placed finishers advancing to a new Super 12s stage. Those 12 teams will be split into four groups of three, all playing each other on a scheduled day. ( keep up at the back!) Obviously venues for these matches will not be known until all of the qualifiers have been decided. The table-toppers in those sections will then make up the four counties who will contest Finals day.

**KO Trophy:**The format remains the same but we will have four new opponents this season. Home games against holders Berkshire and Devon, a visit to near neighbours Oxfordshire and a slightly longer journey down to Redruth in Cornwall !

**Championship:** Sadly no trip up to Norwich this season to their Festival of cricket as Norfolk were relegated last season. They have been replaced by Div Two champions Bedfordshire, with the match being played at Flitwick. Our other away game will see us journey to Sleaford in the middle of Lincolnshire, which makes a change from our usual destination of Grantham.

#### TWO OF BUCKS CHAMPIONSHIP WINNING HEROES ARE MOVING TO NEW CLUBS

Bucks Cricket Men's 1st XI players Tom Hampton and Ross Richardson have signed for new Home Counties Premier League sides for the 2024 season.

After 7 successive seasons at High Wycombe, the National Counties side's skipper, Hampton, has opted to take on a new challenge after deciding to leave, and has signed for Division One side Wokingham. Hampton (Hampo) was an integral part of the club since he joined in 2016 from Gloucestershire, firstly becoming Head Coach and then Club Captain as well as being part of 3 title winning campaigns. Tom should feel at home at Wokingham as they are skippered by ex Bucks opener Shaan Khan, a very stylish and talented batsman. Also at Wokingham is T20 specialist Conrad Louth

Richardson has made the move from Blackheath in the Surrey Premier League, who he joined after leaving Durham University, to Henley for the new campaign. The Bucks wicketkeeper-batsman, who scored a century in the National Counties Championship Final, has opted to don the colours with the former Home Counties, Division 1 Champions.

## Addendum- Highest Bucks Wicket Partnerships – All Ages

Apologies but in the last edition, I mentioned the highest ever Bucks partnership in an article, but omitted to say that it was 322, by Jason Harrison and Paul Sawyer in 1998. It gives me the opportunity to again congratulate Danny Chapman (150 off 230 balls) and Aum Raykar (169 off 153 balls) who put on 294 for Bucks Boys U18s at Gt Witchingham CC. - believed to be the second highest Bucks partnership for any wicket and at any level.



Ex Bucks Pathway player Raph Weatherall has signed his first professional contract with Northamptonshire. Young quick Weatherall now begins a two year rookie deal until the end of 2025. ## Seek and Ye Shall Find - Reprised

Another blog from Yahoo Over Cow Corner to remind us of the joys of watching National Counties cricket at very pleasant country grounds.

In recent times, August has become the most divisive month in the English cricketing calendar. The advent of the Hundred and its placement amongst the supposedly prime month of the season has led to much chewing of the cud and rancorous discussions about the lack of red ball cricket during the thirty-one days.

Whisper it quietly but a ready-made enjoyable alternative exists and has done for some time. Featuring twenty participants across two divisions in two conferences, the National Counties Championship features red ball cricket played across the breadth of August. Mention of the second level of shires provokes a particular reaction amongst many though .Perhaps some are deterred by the lack of first-class status of the National Counties Championship. Cricket's old bugbear remains paramount, particularly in English cricket, but such an occurrence doesn't detract from the quality of cricket on display. Indeed, many a National County team will feature players who have either played first class cricket or are on the cusp of reaching such an achievement. Nevertheless, maybe a small recalibration of one's cricketing brain is all that's needed to overcome the issue of status.

Ultimately, the quality and intrigue of a contest is not altered by whether a particular status is afforded to said contest. (In many respects, the somewhat random nature in which some contests are afforded first-class status arguably dilutes the standard to some extent) Indeed, there are a number of interesting nuances and developments that provide subtext and narrative to each contest. Matches begin on Sundays, thus fulfilling one of the most common gripes regarding the lack of weekend cricket in the first class season, whilst spin bowling remains important and influential with many counties playing two practitioners. In the event of overs being lost during a day, the next day's play will begin at 10.30, a policy that is regularly proffered by supporters to remedy the often tardy nature of the first class game.

Similarly, the two division structure has added intrigue and interest to almost every match whilst the current season witnessed a final between Buckinghamshire and Devon, arguably not the most obvious pairing once the competition began after Berkshire had claimed the title at the conclusion five out of the last six times it was contested. Nevertheless, prior to the Home County's domination there had been eight different winners in eight seasons, highlighting the variety of different counties claiming overall honours. Although the overall title is now limited to just half of the counties, it should be noted that both Buckinghamshire and Devon were promoted at the conclusion of the 2022 season prior to reaching the Championship final of the 2023 campaign, underlining that the guard often changes and at great speed.

Perhaps one of the more intriguing aspects of the Championship is the ninety overs limit to each county's first innings, dictating that both teams will, weather permitting, bat on the first day of the match. The tactical nuances and subtleties surrounding protecting a lead or conceding a lead provide a different angle from which to win a contest whilst the set up of the three days and the lack of overs restrictions in the second innings dictates that extraordinary performances occasionally come to fruition. Thus, one's own personal experiences of the 2023 Championship included a match where Shropshire's George Hargrave completed an astonishing century-double century combo that allowed the West Midlands county to defeat their hosts, Dorset, despite conceding over 400 in the first innings. Host county Dorset played both of their home Championship matches at The Leaze in Wimborne; a delightful ground just a five minute bimble from the most pleasant town centre where during lunch one can wander around quiet lanes alongside the River Allen. Such an occurrence highlights how the National Counties circuit regularly visits some of the country's more humble locales that possess charm and attraction aplenty.

Perambulations inside of the grounds also provide a pleasant aspect or two as, within reason, spectators are able to mix with the players in the pavilion as, most of the time, the players are approachable and happy to chat and cogitate on many a matter. Indeed, the more social aspect of National Counties cricket is perhaps no better highlighted than how counties will usually use social media channels to thank host clubs and the unsung volunteers that have aided each contest whilst there seems more of a general sense of camaraderie between the various counties that is perhaps not so prevalent in the professional game.

Thus, there is plenty to like, enjoy and be impressed about the National Counties Championship. And, for most cricket supporters, very much within easy reach. Of the eighteen first class counties only two, Sussex and Kent, do not border a National equivalent. Some counties share borders with two or three National Counties, thus providing a number of spectating opportunities.

In some respects, one of the National Counties' more pleasant aspects could also be one of its weaker points though. Playing matches in smaller locales than the first class equivalents undoubtedly proves pleasing and more than useful for spectators arriving by car but for those relying on public transport, particularly trains, following the Championship in person could prove very difficult, if not impossible. Nevertheless, on-site free-parking and no charge for admittance certainly sweeten any logistical inconveniences. Such foibles highlight one of the enduring delights of the National Counties Championship: it may not be perfect, but it is mighty fine and very much provides plenty of red ball succour during the season's most divisive month.

#### WIDE OF THE MARK

In a Minor Counties fixture between Dorset and Cheshire in 1998, the Dorset captain, Andrew Wingfield Digby is a vicar, contrived to set up an interesting finish to the game by conceding quick runs. He instructed his bowler to send down a series of very wide wides, each of which would go to the boundary. Fourteen wides were bowled in the over and four runs were scored off the bat. Sixty runs in all. Given a fighting chance of victory, Cheshire took up the challenge but eventually lost by 18 runs.

## THE EUROPEAN CRICKET T10 CHAMPIONSHIPS – MEN



National

Counties XI won the Dream 11 European Championship for the second time in 3 years with an emphatic 8 wickets win over defending champions Netherlands XI in the final at the Cartama Oval near Malaga. A superb unbeaten 71 from 24 balls from Oxfordshire's former Sussex left-hander Tom Hinley swept National Counties to a target of 146 with 11 balls to spare. Hinley thumped eight sixes in a thrilling display of clean hitting that helped National Counties, representing England in the 31-nation competition, to avenge their defeat by the Dutch in the final 12 months ago. It was the second win for National Counties over Netherlands in the day as it followed a 15 runs victory in a qualifier earlier on Finals Day. That win secured National Counties passage to the final and gave them four hours to recover from their exertions before the showpiece match. National Counties' success was achieved in adversity with a gastric bug affecting a number of players during Champions Week. Cumbria slow left-armer Matt Siddall missed the whole of the week and Greatwood, the former Middlesex seamer, only returned to action in first qualifier against Netherlands on Champions Day.

## THE EUROPEAN CRICKET T10 CHAMPIONSHIPS – WOMEN

The NCCA Women's team will make history as they make their debut at the inaugural Women's European Championship taking place in Spain from Dec 17 to Dec 22. The National Counties men's team are no strangers to the Cartama Oval near Malaga as they have won the Dream 11 European twice in three years, Now it is the turn of the newly-formed Women's team who will represent the NCCA as an England XI, who will take on Austria, Netherland, Italy and hosts Spain in the T10 competition that starts on Sunday December 17 and concludes with Finals Day on Friday December 22. The England XI will be coached by former England Test player Beth Morgan, who is now Head of the Emerging Player Programme for the Southern Vipers.

England XI will play the other four competing countries (Spain ,Italy, Austria and Netherlands) twice during the week to determine the line-up for Finals Day. **England squad.**

## Review of the 2023 Home Counties Premier League, Div 1 season by ETDC Digital Media

As the celebrations subside and clubs dwindle down into off-season normality, it is only right to incorporate some of the key performances of the year into a season overview. Firstly, we must say congratulations to High Wycombe Cricket Club on an undefeated run throughout the season – a record only completed once before by Henley a few years prior. With 310 points in total, High Wycombe cleared the rest of the field by 63 points – the equivalent of just over four 50 over wins. With 11 wins, 4 draws and 3 games coming to no results due to weather, High Wycombe stomped on the competition this year, no real teams came close. And it's unsurprising with four Wycombe batsmen-Eliot Callis, AJ Woodland, Brock Hardy and Teddie Casterton – all scoring in the top 7 run scorers of the league. Not only that but three of their bowlers – AJ Woodland, Conner Haddow and Cameron Parsons – also finished up in the top 9 wicket-takers of the season.

That being said, the individual performances were relatively spread around. Eliot Callis was the leading run scorer for the first 15 games, but a series of poor scores at the end of the season allowed Billy Mead to take over and be crowned champion of the batsmen. Having struck 793 runs at an average of just over 66, Mead got past the half-century mark in half of his innings for the season, managing to convert two of them to hundreds. His consistent run-scoring mentality had allowed him to be called up to Berkshire for his debut, a strong side that won the NCCA One-Day Finals.

Whilst we're on the batting, it would be hard not to mention Calvin Dickinson's insane century and a half against Henley on May 27th. A freak innings that allowed him to race to 180 off just 97 deliveries; that's the 8th highest total in Home Counties history – the highest the 215\* by Aftab Khan.

It is safe to say it has been an incredible season with the bat, testament to the groundsmen at each club for producing incredible wickets. Three other batsmen scored a century and a half including, AJ Woodland, Eliot Callis and Hayden Rossouw. But as the batsmen put away their pads and bats into the loft for the next few months, we'll tell some stories of the bowlers. Benjamin Le Bas finishes the season as the leading wicket-taker (36); that's three ahead of Adam Searle and four ahead of Mohammed Rizvi. In a game against Wargrave – a team who looked strong on paper at the start of the season, but costed with a point penalty – Le Bas picked up 7-32 in his 9 over spell and restricted Wargrave to 125 all out: a comfortable 136-run win. This season, he remained steadfast and strong in his deliveries, enabling himself to pick up four 5-wicket-hauls and a strike rate of 20. Although he managed to top the bowling table, his figures of 7-32 unbelievably weren't the best of the season. Fellow Aston Rowant teammate Leo Bethell took that crown from him as he turned over 8-42 against Wokingham in just 16 overs. ## UPDATE ON RON HEDLEY'S SPONSORED CHARITY WALKS

Late Autumn Update: Walks 14, 15, 16 and 17.

Oxfordshire, Somerset, Hampshire and Cambridgeshire / Hunts.

The fourteenth walk, involving England Cricket Seniors was organised by Clive Ricks on behalf of Oxfordshire CCC Over 60s and took place in the delightful village of Cumnor in Oxfordshire on Friday 8th September 2023.

Fourteen people met at 4.30pm in the local pub car park, it happened that the day was probably the hottest of the 2023 summer. Unfortunately, we had some people drop out of the walk as they decided it was far too hot for walking. We could not argue with their decision and we are pleased to say that most of them joined us at the village pub for drinks and dinner after the walk.

The walk took us along the Thames and was delightful, leaving the lovely village before walking through woodland and across fields, skirting by the side of the river as we walked. We entered the village from a different direction discovering how lucky Clive is to live in such a delightful village. We walked 5.8 miles and I am delighted to say that in the intense heat everybody made it without a problem.

The thirsty walkers retired to the pub garden to quench thirsts and have a lovely evening meal. We thank Clive for organising the walk, to those who took part in the walk, or joined the walkers for the meal and to all those who donated to the cause.

**Walk number fifteen** took us to the delightful County Ground, Taunton for a walk arranged by Somerset Over 60s and Over 70s which turned into a memorable day for the 22 people who joined the walk. Steve Pursey was responsible for arranging the Somerset walk and he was able to get us permission to meet at and walk from The County Ground. It was arranged that we would walk in the morning and then all walkers were given tickets to watch the Championship match between Somerset and Kent.

A wet start to the day held up play until after lunch but it did not deter the walkers from having a delightful walk around the lovely town of Taunton. On arriving back at the County Ground, we were invited onto the outfield to have a photo with a few of the Somerset players and introduced to the crowd, who were encouraged to talk to us about our walks and to donate, which many did. We thank the players for giving up their time to join us. Somerset CCC have the most interesting museum within the ground and we were encouraged to visit it during the day.

Little did we know that we would see a picture of the father of one of Buckinghamshire's Over 60s/70s on a cigarette card from the 1950s. John Pothecary's father played for Hampshire CCC and played one game for Somerset, I hope that is correct. Patrick Draycott of the museum staff had produced a power point display about Bob Willis, his career and his battle with prostate cancer. We are so thankful to Patrick for doing such an amazing thing to celebrate Bob and our day in Taunton. Some of the walkers had booked lunch in the delightful Somerset CCC carvery. None of us were aware of the surprises awaiting us when we went into lunch.

The carvery manager took our collecting bucket to put on the bar in the hope of more donations. He then announced that the P.A System was set up so the diners could be told about the people in Ron's March T shirts and what they are about. The bigger shock was when he informed Ron Hedley that he would be speaking to the 150 or so diners. After a delightful carvery meal Ron did take to the microphone to inform the people present of why we are raising awareness and funds to fight such an awful disease. Amongst the diners was Past President of Kent CCC, Vice Admiral Tim Laurence. Ron enjoyed a few words with Tim after lunch and Tim was delighted to support our campaign. Somerset CCC also allowed us to go amongst the crowd with our collection bucket and over £300 was raised. We are so grateful to Spencer Bishop & Matthew Counsell of Somerset CCC for making the day so memorable.

How do you follow that you may ask, we followed it by joining Hampshire CCC Over 60s/70s for a walk at the Ageas Bowl, Southampton on Wednesday 27th September as Hampshire CCC took on Surrey CCC who were hoping to be crowned County Championship, Division One, champions during the match. **Walk sixteen** had 16 people taking part in a morning walk and again all were invited to watch the days play at The Ageas Bowl. The weather was set fine and Geoff Beale took us on a lovely walk around the local area which the ground is in. On arriving back at the ground, we were asked to meet at a particular part of the ground at a time to coincide with the lunch interval. We thank the Hampshire players who signed a Ron's March T shirt to be auctioned at some point in the near future. Many thanks to the staff of Hampshire CCC.

**The seventeenth walk** and the last arranged for 2023, at the moment, was organise by Nick Andrews on behalf of Cambs/Hunts Over 60s/70s and took place from the Thorpe Wood Golf Club in Peterborough on Tuesday 3rd October and coincided with Pat's birthday. It was great to walk with Nick as I played cricket for Amersham Hill CC, and on joining the Club in 1974, I played a few years with Nicks father, a delightful man. Fifteen people took part and we were treated to a delightful walk with a variety of interesting points of interest.

Photos with royalty, a TV appearance and meeting sporting heroes – table tennis stalwart Ron Hedley has literally taken it all in his stride during a series of walks to raise funds for prostate cancer research. A grassroots volunteer for more than 40 years, Ron is well known to table tennis devotees in Buckinghamshire as County Match Secretary and a long-serving umpire. He is a life member of both Bucks TTA and the High Wycombe TT League, where he has played since 1974. His county and umpiring roles go back to the late 1970s and he was recognised by being awarded the Leslie Forrest Memorial Trophy for services to county table tennis in 2008. He was also runner-up in the Contribution to Table Tennis category at the 2021 Pride of Table Tennis Awards.

The Pride of Table Tennis Awards citation read: "Thousands of players in Buckinghamshire have benefitted from Ron's commitment and organisational skills . . . he has dedicated a lifetime to table tennis to ensure the enjoyment of others."

However, it is his other sporting love – cricket – which set him on course to raise £50,000 to help combat prostate cancer, saw him rub shoulders with household names and make it on to Sky Sports during last summer's memorable Ashes cricket series. Having joined Sky Sports' Jeff Stelling on one of his March for Men walks in 2017 to raise funds for prostate cancer research, Ron was himself diagnosed with prostate and bone cancer in late 2018 and underwent over a year of chemotherapy and radiotherapy and has a three-monthly injection to keep the cancer at bay. Through his role playing for and being Chairman of Bucks' over-60s and over-70s cricket teams, Ron realised he had a large audience he could talk to about the importance of testing to catch prostate cancer early. He organised a fundraising cricket match, a lunch which was joined by Mary Berry and Michael Parkinson, and an auction, and then a series of nine walks around cricket grounds in Buckinghamshire to help get that message across. The final event was a lunch attended by England cricket legend Allan Lamb and former Luton Town footballer Mick Harford, both prostate cancer sufferers, and took the total raised to £22,000. And that, so Ron thought, would be the end of the fundraising.

But then he met Lauren Clark, the wife of England cricket hero Bob Willis, who had recently died from the disease and had inspired the Bob Willis Fund to raise money to combat the disease, which affects one in eight men. The meeting spurred Ron to launch another series of up to 33 walks, one in each of the counties which play over-60s cricket. He is joined on each walk by cricketers from that

county and has so far completed 17. He has set a date of September 15th next near - his 75th birthday - for the final walk, which he hopes will be at the 'home of cricket', Lord's.

The running (or should that be walking) total for that series is now more than £30,000, taking his total raised through the £50,000 mark. The money has been raised through donations by walkers and the public and through bucket collections at the lunches which end each walk – they walk around five miles each time and end with lunch at a pub or at a county cricket ground. It's been absolutely sensational to raise so much," said Ron, "I thought if I could do 10 walks and raise £10,000, I would be delighted. It's incredible how it's just blossomed.

"But more than anything, you're getting awareness out there. You need to get the message through to men to be tested. There aren't any symptoms most of the time – I never knew I had it, other than going to the toilet more at night, but my wife nagged me to go and get tested."

Along the way, Ron has had some amazing experiences, including meeting Vice Admiral Sir Tim Laurence, the husband of Princess Anne, at the county cricket ground in Taunton after the Somerset walk earlier this year.

At the Warwickshire walk in March, they were joined by England great Ian Bell and Warwickshire legends Andy Lloyd and Tim Munton. The walk was filmed by Sky Sports, who also interviewed Ron, his wife Pat and the cricketers, with the finished film shown during June's Ashes Test match at Edgbaston – which was designated as the fundraising centrepiece for the Bob Willis Fund. "To be on TV, to meet royalty and to do 17 walks, with all the people I've met – I never anticipated that," said Ron. "I'm not even much of a walker! "Walking around the outfield of the Ageas Bowl in Southampton being applauded by the crowd was highly embarrassing but incredible. "People keep praising me, but it's not about me, it's just about getting that message out there."
