HERE COMES SUMMER

School is out, oh happy day Here comes summer I'm gonna grab my girl and run away Here comes summer We'll go swimmin' every day Oh, let the sun shine bright on my happy summer home

Hands up all those who remember Jerry Keller's huge No 1 hit in the summer of 1959 – in fact hands up all those who can remember 1959! A whole summer of cricket, football and rock n roll to look forward to - not much has changed then, although cricket meant only the County Championship, football was played with a leather ball and you had proper studs in your football boots and rock n roll could only be listened to late at night on Radio Luxembourg under the covers. I suppose we did have rain back then, but over the last few years we seem to have had more of it, and at the wrong times ie, just as Spring has sprung and expectations for the new season are high. Pity the poor groundsmen who have been toiling tirelessly, often under grim conditions, to prepare for the start of the season, which does seem to start earlier and earlier, almost certainly due to the number of different competitions that have to be squeezed in. Many of us are now like kids at Christmas, waiting expectantly, not for Santa to pop down the chimney, but for the first ball to be bowled in anger. Our first competitive match is in the T20 competition, on Sunday 14th April at home to Bedfordshire, but before that we have the annual challenge match against Oxfordshire for the Nurton-York Cup which was set up four years ago to honour two Minor County greats – Mike Nurton from Oxfordshire and Stuart York from Buckinghamshire. Venue for this year's encounter is High Wycombe and will comprise two T20 matches.

Before we start on the T20 competition, there are two additional matches for your delectation. It all kicks off on Sunday April 7th at Wormsley where there will be a Bucks Intra Squad match – a chance to view all the likely contenders from the Ist XI and the Reserves. We then have two friendly T20 matches against Herefordshire and this will take place at Aston Rowant. This will be followed a week later by the afore mentioned annual Nurton-York Cup match (two T20 matches) against Oxfordshire at High Wycombe.

NCCA T20 COMPETITION (2 matches per day) 2024

This season the NCCA have tweaked the way the T20 Cup will be played. This undoubtedly follows some grumblings about the way the four counties making it through to Finals day were determined. In previous years, there have been four groups of five, with just the winners of each section progressing to Finals day. However, this has now been altered for the 2024 campaign.

There will now be five groups of four, with the other three clubs in our T20 group being Bedfordshire, Berkshire and Hertfordshire. Obviously with only 4 teams per group, each club will only play on 3 occasions rather than 4, and we have two of the three at home . I'm guessing that will be switched around for next season.

We start our campaign with home matches against Bedfordshire, to be played at High Wycombe –no introduction needed – on 28th April, and the following week we are on the road to sunny Berkshire where we will to play at Falkland, a ground which has seen major renovations in the last 3 to 4 years. A brand new pavilion has sprung up (picture below) - now that is a make over, and the ground has hosted Southern Vipers in the last year.



The next day, Bank Holiday Monday, we are back home to play Hertfordshire at Beaconsfield, pictured below.



It is 19 years since we last played a competitive match at Wilton Park – in fact we played there twice in 2005 – a Minor Counties KO game against Wiltshire in June and a Championship match against Staffordshire in July. We did try to play the Nurton-York friendly there a couple of years ago, but unfortunately the weather won that contest.

The group winners, group runners-up and two best third-placed finishers will advance to a new Super 12s stage. Those 12 teams will be split into four groups of three, all playing each other on a scheduled day. (keep up at the back!) Obviously venues for these matches will not be known until all of the qualifiers have been decided.

The table-toppers in those sections will then make up the four counties who will contest Finals day, which has now been moved to Chester Boughton Hall.

2024 NCCA: Tom Hampton talks Bucks Cricket Men's 2024 - preparation & forthcoming season



Skipper Tom Hampton has spoken about his Bucks Cricket Men's side; preparation, plans and structure for 2024.

The current red ball title holders for the National Counties returned to prepare for the forthcoming campaign under a new dynamic. With Bucks Cricket having merged all the different facets under one umbrella, the county can now facilitate an improvement in their professional approach. The way Bucks Cricket has changed in the time Hampton has been captain typifies this. As he approaches his seventh year in charge, he explained what had been happening behind the scenes.

"We had a slightly different winter this year, with Jason (Harrison) now being full time with the County. This allowed us to run an extended winter training programme with sessions running from the middle of January, through until our outdoor pre-season which is starting Easter weekend. This has been a nice change and has allowed a few of the younger guys an opportunity to get involved with the squad. We have also had some guys who have been overseas, and done well, which is pleasing."

With the squad's 2024 season curtain-raiser planned at Wormsley for 7th April, Hampton knows his side are looking forward to getting back out in the middle.

"We are just about to get into pre-season, which everyone is excited for. It's always nice getting outside playing on grass and getting the whole squad together. With the season being pushed back a little, that has also allowed us to get three fixtures in place, which will hopefully be another benefit in trying to hit the ground running."

The winter has seen Bucks strengthen their squad, with Hampton explaining the circumstances behind the signings.

"Yes we have a couple of new additions in Billy Mead and Cameron Hemp, who are both really exciting players and we are looking forward to seeing them represent the county."

Mead made an unbeaten 106 for Kent on debut against a Sri Lanka Development XI in May 2022, while Hemp was part of the England XI side who won the 2023 European Cricket title.

"It was two different sets of circumstances.

Billy contacted Jason (Harrison) to explore the possibility of being one of our outside players and, after a couple of positive meetings, made the decision to join us.

Cameron will be playing for High Wycombe this summer so is eligible to play for the county. He made the decision to join us and leave Wales with the travel being too much of a commitment.

So, we didn't do too much but we are really pleased with the outcome. To add two players of quality to the squad is a huge positive, and one that can only improve us as a county."

As the NCCA T20 starts on 28th April, we asked the Bucks Cricket Men's Xi skipper what the pre-season friendlies were, and what were they looking to get out of these encounters.

"We have an Intra-Squad game, which is great as we get to see the wider squad play, including all the guys from the 2nd team. This is followed by two lots of T20s versus Oxfordshire and Herefordshire. Like every year pre-season is really important for individuals to get themselves up to speed and ready for that first competitive match, as well as guys on the fringes to really push their case to be in that first match day eleven. It will be a case of getting as many guys as possible as much cricket as we can, as well as trying a few different combinations to give us the best idea on selection for that first game. The way the fixtures work, our group games are played over an eight-day period, so it's going to be hugely important to start well."

There is a new era for Bucks Cricket in the men's game. We asked how does the link between the 1st XI, 2nd XI and U18s work in 2024 and what plans are in place for continuing to bring

players through the system? Also what values do you look to instil in these young players so they fit the culture and environment when they step up?

"Over the past couple of years alongside the merger, this link has improved and strengthened immensely. Jason (Harrison - Head of Performance) now oversees both 1st and 2nd teams and is heavily involved with the U18's. Stan (Simon Stanway) is involved with both the 1st and 2nd team, as well as being a permanent fixture with the 18's, alongside Malcolm Roberts. This has helped create a direct pathway from the 18s to the first team, and we have seen a number of examples of players taking that over the last year or so.

I think as a group our message has always been quite simple, we want players to go out and express themselves, enjoy the game and be willing to learn and improve to give themselves and the county the best chance of being successful. I really believe that now you have such a consistent coaching/management team throughout the top end it really helps to keep things simple and consistent. I think the players are reacting to that and have identified there are opportunities for those who work hard and perform."

So what are the aims for white and red ball cricket in 2024?

"The ultimate aim in any competition is to win and be successful, but I think we are at two different points in the different formats. In white ball cricket it's really about finding a way to be more consistent with our performances. Then red ball is about building on the success of the last two years. There will be a target on our back, so we will have to raise our game."

One negative over the winter has been the loss of the highly-rated Jack Perham, the Strength and Conditioning Coach.

"There is no denying it's a big loss as Jack added a huge amount of expertise and energy to the role. He came in at a time when we needed to implement some change. He did a great job and can be very proud of the part he had in our success. It's now on the squad and management group to ensure that we don't let standards drop and continue to improve. The county is looking to appoint a new Strength & Conditioning Coach for match days, which will be very helpful in the continued development of that side of things."

In closing, what is Hampton's message to Bucks Cricket supporters for the new campaign?

"The squad's in a great place, with a couple of exciting additions, and we can't wait to get going this summer. As always, we really appreciated all the support last year and it was really great to see so many supporters up in West Brom to enjoy the championship win. We will do all we can to try to emulate that success again this summer."

England seniors cricket will play host to the inaugural 70s World Cup in a two week tournament starting on July 28th this summer with the final to be held at Wormsley on Sunday 11th August starting at 11.30 am. Other round robin matches, which commence at 12.00 noon, will be played at senior club grounds within an hour or so drive of Slough where most of the participating countries will be based. Bucks grounds included to date are Marlow, Beaconsfield, Amersham, and Farnham Royal.

Seven countries will be participating in what are 45 overs a side matches they are, England, current holders of the Silver Ashes, Australia, Canada, India, New Zealand, Sri Lanka, and Wales. Everything gets underway with a launch and registration event on the 27th July to be held at Eton Rowing Lake, previously home to the 2012 Olympic rowing events.

Matches (1pm start) will be played across Bucks at

Amersham C.C. Beaconsfield C.C. Farnham Royal C.C. and Marlow C. C. The full schedule for the competition, including all dates and venues, can be found at the end of this Newsletter.



WOMENS CRICKET – THE FUTURE

Women's cricket is now facing it's third major structural reorganization in 8 years. The current women's domestic set- up consists of 8 regions: South East Stars, Sunrisers, North West Thunder, Central Sparks, Western Storm, The Blaze, Northern Diamonds and Southern Vipers, all currently owned and funded by the ECB. However, in 2025, these teams will be no more, and they will be replaced by County sides.

The 18 first-class counties plus MCC have been given until March 10 to submit bids to own, govern and operate one of eight Tier One professional teams who will play in T20 and 50 over competitions. Underneath them will sit Tiers Two and Three , also connected to counties or National Counties, which will be amateur. There will be no promotion or relegation from any of the tiers until at least 2029.

Latest Update: As we ago to press, it has been revealed that the vast majority of first class counties have submitted bids for a Tier One team – only Worcestershire and Derbyshire have not and the MCC have not submitted a bid either.

Cameron Hemp joins Home Counties Champions High Wycombe

Home Counties Premier League reigning Champions High Wycombe have announced the signing of England XI's Cameron Hemp. Thanks to Teddie Casterton and ETDC Digital Media for the following interview

High Wycombe Cricket Club are pleased to announce the signing of opening left-handed batter, Cameron Hemp. After Wycombe had won the HCPCL 2023 undefeated, the success story travelled borders as Hemp was eying up the possibility of playing cricket in England rather than in Wales for further opportunities within the professional game.

"AJ reached out at the start of the year. I've heard great things about the club and the success they've had over the last few years."

AJ Woodland and Cameron Hemp have regularly competed against one another in the NCCA competition for Bucks and Wales respectively. Hemp was additionally selected to be a part of the winning England XI T10 squad who travelled to the Malaga Oval, Spain this year alongside Wycombe off-spinner Conner Haddow.

"It's one of my proudest moments," Hemp added in an interview with ETDC Digital Media. Hemp had an impressive year for Swansea CC in 2023, accumulating 739 runs and a top score of 125 against Cardiff. That was just shy of his previous best in 2022 of 152* against Clevedon CC. "I'm really looking forward to winning lots of games and hopefully picking up some silverware," Hemp said.

Hemp is one of two new signings for the High Wycombe 1st Xi this year, Max Uttley – another England XI player – having joined earlier this year.

Captain AJ Woodland commented: "Really excited to have Cam Hemp onboard for this year. He brings a lot of quality with bat, a very dynamic player who will add a different skill set to our batting line up. We look forward to seeing him have a successful year in a Wycombe shirt".

Sports Shots interview with Harefield skipper Stephen Croft ahead of the upcoming 2024 HCPCL campaign. :Croft talks Harefield as Solia joins as overseas for upcoming campaign

Sports Shots Andy Bone talks to Harefield skipper Stephen Croft Harefield skipper Stephen Croft has talked about his side's upcoming campaign as Sean Solia has joined as their overseas player.

The 2024 season sees Croft take charge of The Hares for his third campaign having got them promoted as Division Two Champions in 2022, but returning back following relegation in 2023.

Croft, who has a young side who have stuck together the past few years, believes the club are making positive steps.

Overall, for the club it was positive, the 2s and 3s were one win away from promotion, the Sunday XI, which had lots of juniors, got promoted in their league, and of the 3 junior teams, 2 won their divisions, which is great. Unfortunately, the 1s went down, but playing in the top league was good experience.

Having had a taste of the top level, both Croft and his team are keen to bounce back straight away and have been working hard over the winter to make this happen.

The preparation has been similar as for most years, we have had weekly nets for both senior and junior teams every week since the end of January. Several guys having been playing abroad which is great experience for them.

The club were keen to replace Nic Kelly, their 2023 overseas, with a player of a similar calibre. Kelly has spent the summer in the southern hemisphere captaining Wellington in New Zealand.

The Hares, under Croft, director of Cricket Doug King and their committee, have been proactive in using their contacts on the other side of the world.

Croft told Sports Shots.

Just one signing confirmed so far this winter and that's the overseas signing of Sean Solia. Sean is an excellent all-round cricketer with a good first-class record. We are very fortunate to have good connections in New Zealand which enabled us to sign a player of this quality.

Solia has represented Samoa internationally and has been playing domestic cricket for Auckland since 2016. As a left-handed batsman and right-arm medium bowler, Solia made his first-class debut for Auckland against Canterbury in November 2016 during the 2016– 17 Plunket Shield season. He also made his Twenty20 debut in December 2016 and his List A debut in January 2017, where he scored an impressive 152 runs. Solia's international career includes being part of Samoa's squad for the 2018–19 ICC World Twenty20 East Asia-Pacific Qualifier tournament. In Samoa's opening match of the qualifier against Papua New Guinea, he was the top scorer for his team with 39 runs and ended up as the joint-leading wicket-taker in the tournament.

The new Hare caught the eye of selectors, who picked him when New Zealand 'A' hosted the touring West Indian side in November 2020. In 2022, Solia was Datchet's overseas for their Home Counties Premier League, Division One campaign.

Croft will be looking for his younger players to learn from their experienced incoming Kiwi. Ollie Stalder has been in the 1s for the last 4 years, he is still only 19/20 and has lots of potential. He has been working hard this winter and I think he will see this rewarded with some consistent performances. Another player who has improved a lot of the last year with the bat is Qasim Khan. He mainly played in the 3s last year but if he keeps on developing with the bat as he has done, he won't be far from playing the 1s.

The Hares skipper is looking for his side to be challenging to go straight back up. As a 1st team we will be looking to compete at the top end of the table. We have the same core group of players that got us promoted in 2022, plus the addition of Sean should help balance the side out.

Ex Bucks pathway player Dominic Goodman signs one-year extension to 2005 at Gloucestershire


As a young cricketer Dom played and captained throughout the Buckinghamshire County age groups. He played his club cricket in the Home Counties Premier League at Chesham CC before moving to play in the West of England Premier League at Bedminster CC in 2019.

23-year-old 6"6 seamer Dom Goodman has signed a one-year contract extension at Gloucestershire through to 2025. Dom made his debut for the Club at Taunton in April 2021, taking three wickets as Gloucestershire cruised to an eight-wicket win against Somerset. His debut scalps of Josh Davey, James Hildreth and George Bartlett were the first of fourteen first-class wickets, including eight wickets in the 2023 season. A career-best of 4-73 came against Division Two champions Durham, with Goodman impressing at the Seat Unique Riverside.

Speaking about his one-year extension, Goodman said: "I feel really privileged to have the opportunity to extend my time with Gloucestershire until 2025, and thankful to the club for their continued belief in me.

Lost Cricket Stickers Book Review



Some cricket books are inevitable; the conclusion of an Ashes series will provoke the expected autopsies and general chewing of the collective fat regarding what went right and what went wrong. Some cricket books are predictable; each calendar year will see the publication of the latest Wisden, the latest Playfair Annual and the latest Who's Who Guide. Some cricket books are banal and tedious; modern autobiographies seem to spend as much time bloodletting and airing of grudges as providing enlightenment and great insight.

Occasionally a cricket book will focus on a subject matter that arrives fresh from the hackneyed leftfield and grabs one's attention. And, in truth, Pitch Publishing are experts in producing titles that their publishing peers would probably not be willing to countenance. Thus, one's regular browse of the 'Upcoming Titles' section on the Pitch website highlighted the title *Lost Cricket Stickers* by Matt Appleby. Tracing the lives of a selection of players from the 1983 county cricket season, the book proves a most intriguing subject matter.

From a personal perspective, one cannot remember the 1983 cricket summer but some of the players featured played a part in the formative years of one's love affair with the game. Indeed, the pictures of John Emburey and Tim Curtis on the front cover bring back memories of the 1989 Ashes series, the first full summer of cricket one can remember, whilst Chris Cowdrey unearths some distant memory of England's disastrous 1988 series against the West Indies.

Curiously, 1983 was one of only two years that a Panini sticker book was produced for county cricket, perhaps adding a sense of poignancy to Appleby's book, whilst the combination of cricket and Panini stickers also provides a sense of nostalgia; back to a time and decade when the collection craze was arguably at its zenith. An introductory chapter provides a more than useful overview of what was contained in the sticker book as well as a fabulous use of the term 'blootering,' one that surely needs to be added to the general cricket lexicon. One or two players are featured from each of the seventeen first-class counties (in a pre-Durham as a first-class county era) in providing insight and individual perspective on the sport at the juncture of the 1983 summer. Appleby concludes each chapter with a brief biography of each county's main protagonists, providing an interesting insight into what has happened to each individual since the 1983 season, both cricketing and post retirement from the sport.

Understandably, it is the stories and the titbits of information and amusing stories that are the most intriguing, such as David Acfield's balancing act of fencing for Great Britain and playing county cricket or Hampshire's Kevin Emery enjoying the opposition batters becoming distracted by matters in the nearby harbour at Portsmouth in the summer of 1982. Similarly, Graeme Fowler's comments about everyone wanting to coach him when he was called up to play for England; a theory that has been expounded by some regarding recent England teams.

One particularly pleasing aspect is that Appleby has not solely interviewed the well-known players of the time but mixes in a number of stalwart pros that provide nice colour, perspective and context whilst the conclusion of each county chapter features pen pictures of the main dramatis personae, including their secular lives after retiring from professional cricket. Some of these prove particularly interesting, such as Kent's Derek Aslett who became an antiques dealer in Australia or Eddie Hemmings who ran a village shop. Somerset's Peter Denning became a grain merchant, former England wicketkeeper Jack Richards moved to Belgium with his Dutch wife and ran a Dutch shipping company whilst Warwickshire's Andy Lloyd became a stud farm manager.

Somewhat pertinently, the book also provides a beautiful insight into a time when cricket was a sport rather than a business as well as highlighting the controversies of the day and how attitudes have changed; some for better, some for worse, in the forty years since. For instance, it proves interesting how the players seemed fairly positive about the relentless schedule, in comparison to the modern equivalent, despite not quite knowing how they managed to play so much. Others commented how they just enjoyed playing; a quality seemingly lacking amongst too many in the modern game, whilst there seems a general fondness for county cricket in the 1980's. One almost universal theme was how each county had two world class overseas players and that international players played for their counties more than they do in the present day, increasing the general standard of the county game. Many an interviewee also talk about how the county scene was more sociable and that there was a greater camaraderie between many, even between those from different teams. Indeed, it is rather remarkable how much detail the various players can remember about their seasons despite proceedings happening forty years in the past.

Perhaps one of the most complimentary remarks one can proffer for *Lost Cricket Stickers* is that once one has begun reading the chapters on each county the book seems to draw one in to the point where one mentally longs to read just one more chapter. Much credit goes to the interviewees who seem genuinely engaging and offer insight aplenty in providing a snapshot of the domestic game in the early 80's. In an era when cricket books are in danger of becoming rather staid and predictable, *Lost Cricket Stickers* is a gloriously different and intriguing equivalent. Without wishing to engage any hyperbole, one concludes that this is one of the best books on cricket that one has read in recent times.
